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Pity opera's poor basses and baritones. They never get the girl, they usually play a bereaved or angry father, or else the role of a treacherous villain. But don't feel too sorry for them; their music is glorious, their opportunities to emote prodigious, and their characters unforgettable.

Each year the Italian Club features a program on the world of opera. Last year, presenter Susan Wohl explored the tenor's role; and now, at our May meeting, it is the work of the basses and baritones that we will exam-

ine and enjoy. By definition, a bass is the male singing voice of the lowest range and a baritone the male voice having a range higher than a bass but lower than a tenor. For her May multi-media presentation, Susan has selected a group of ten of the most famous arias ever written for these voices by some of the greatest performers in the history of opera. A frequent and popular Italian Club speaker, Susan Wohl is a lecturer on opera at Washington University's Lifelong Learning Institute. **by Gene Mariani**

"Those Mysterious Etruscans" by Anna Amelung, Ph.D.

Anna Amelung gave another of her memorable and charming presentations at the April meeting, The Mysterious Etruscans was an exciting presentation made all the more so by the witty asides and mannerisms of our own Doctor Anna. She described the Etruscan vivacity, exuberance, and quick intelligence as something almost mystical. She discussed their hilltop towns and their cemeteries. Their origins remain clear, perhaps, Lydia in Asia Minor. However, they migrated to Italy sometime during the 8th century BC or earlier. Etruscan country stretched from the Po Valley to Naples. Their emergence in the Italian peninsula seemed sudden, with the first stage known as the Villanovan, where they are thought to have emerged with the autochthon populations. They were famous for their metalwork, using iron from Elba. They created beautiful artifacts, sculptures and beautiful gold jewelry. The early Romans acknowledged and often begrudged Etruscan superi-

ority, knowledge and power. The perceived haughtiness and corruption of the Etruscans is shown in the legend of Lucretia, the virtuous Roman noblewoman that was raped by an Etruscan. She committed suicide in front of her male relatives to prove her innocence, so becoming the symbol of Roman purity, virtue and strength.

Anna's presentation was, as always, beautifully presented and received with great applause and appreciation by the members. Anna Amelung is a magnificent example of the presentations that are made by Italian Club members. She was marvelous!

Anna Amelung received a Laureate from the Università di Bologna and a Ph.D. in French from Washington University and currently teaches French and Latin at University City HS. She is past President of the Classical Club of St. Louis and an active Italian Club member.

Kathryn Thompson Favazza, Soprano, returns to St. Louis after making her New York debut in the title role of *Lucia di Lammermoor* in the Rutger's Benefit for the Homeless Concert. Last year she performed Gilda, *Rigoletto*, to high acclaim with the same company. Duomo di Orvieto

"Miracolo d'arte sorto per custodire un Miracolo di fede"



Nel 1263 Pietro da Praga, un prete boemo, si fermò a Bolsena a celebrare la Santa Messa e vide cadere dall'Ostia il sangue di Cristo, tanto che il Corporale ne fu bagnato. Papa Urbano IV, che si trovava ad Orvieto, ordinò che il Sacro Lino fosse portato lì per dargli una sede dignitosa e con la "Bolla Transiturus" estese a tutto il mondo cattolico la festa del Corpus Domini.

Il 13 novembre del 1290, il Papa Nicolò IV pose la prima pietra della nuova Chiesa. I lavori durarono circa tre secoli, fra gli architetti vi furono Arnolfo di Cambio, Fra Bevignate da Perugia, Giovanni Uguccione, Lorenzo Maitani. Il risultante Duomo di Orvieto è una delle più significative creazioni dell'architettura gotica italiana.



La facciata, a forma di trittico, risplende di marmi policromi, sculture, mosaici, e colonne. Caratteristici il portale mediano e il rosone centrale ad opera di Andrea Orcagna. Il materiale impiegato per gli esterni e gli interni è prevalentemente basalto e travertine o combinati insieme in strisce dal colore contrastante. L'interno del Duomo appare semplice ed austero con tre navate, ancora di carattere romanico. Transetto e presbiterio, invece, hanno già forme gotiche. Nel transetto, su

progetto di Ippolito Scalza fu posto l'organo, ritenuto uno fra i più grandi d'Italia. Il Reliquiario del Corporale è l'opera più importante del Duomo, in esso è custodito il sacro Lino del Miracolo di Bolsena. Le superfici sono rivestite di figurazioni a smalto, sui due prospetti sono illustrate le storie del miracolo di Bolsena e le vicende della vita di Cristo. Il duomo di Orvieto è celebre anche

per gli affreschi iniziati dal Beato Angelico con l'aiuto di Benozzo Gozzoli, e il Giudizio Universale di Luca Signorelli nella Cappella di San Brizio. Dicono che Michelangelo ne sia stato ispirato per il suo Giudizio Universale nella Cappella Sistina.



La festa della Palombella e del Corpus Domini

La festa della Palombella di Orvieto fu istituita nel secolo XV per iniziativa della famiglia dei Monaldeschi e si celebra ogni anno nel giorno della Pentecoste. Alle ore 12 il Vescovo, dal Palazzo dell'Opera del Duomo, agita un lino bianco. A questo segnale, il Capo Mastro fa accendere i razzi intorno ad una raggiera sulla quale è sistemata una colomba Bianca, che dal "cielo" posto sul tetto della Chiesa di S. Francesco scivola velocemente lungo un cavo di acciaio fino a raggiungere il "Cenacolo" situato sul sagrato



del Duomo. La rappresentazione simboleggia la discesa dello Spirito Santo sopra gli Apostoli e dall'esito della cerimonia - secondo un'antica tradizione - si traevano auspici per l'annata agricola in corso.

La colomba viene donata ad una coppia di sposi che la tiene fino a morte naturale.
